In the Gospel of John there are seven "I Am" statements by Jesus, "I am the True Vine" is the last of these. All of these sayings give us an insight into what Jesus, and God, are like. The others are: I Am The Bread Of Life (John 6:35), I Am The Light Of The World (John 8:12), I Am The Gate For The Sheep (John 10:7), I Am The Good Shepherd (John 10:11), I Am The Resurrection And The Life (John 11:25), I Am The Way The Truth And The Life (John 14:6).

When we talk about 'being connected' we need to be mindful of those children/young people who feel that they are isolated or only connected to a small number of people. They may feel that the idea of 'connection' is out of reach or unrealistic. We hope tha

Alternative game - Connecting Competition

Provide the group with as many different materials as possible, junk modelling, or just newspaper, or perhaps something like marshmallows and spaghetti.

Now in small teams the group race against each other to create the longest creation in a set time.

At the end of the time, the team must be able to hold it up (with team members along the length) without it breaking. This will reinforce the importance of good strong connections being key to good growth.

Explore

Ideas and activities to explore this week's Bible passage together

A new way to explore the passage

This is a fun way to explore the Bible verse, so let go and be creative together.

Give the children some time to decide which fruit they would like to be like and why. The reason needs to be a positive one and preferably one which has a positive effect on others. The reason and the fruit do not need to match (One person may chose strawberries because it's their favourite fruit but for the vine it will represent love). Then recreate the Bible verse in motion, like a little dance. Some people perhaps could be the vine (Or the vine could be a large picture and the children could come and stand along the vine instead) and others come dancing up one at a time and join the vine saying what fruit they are and why. You

could do this a couple of times, especially if the children have more than one fruit they would like to be.

You could talk about how that fruit helps the other fruits and the whole vine. You could discuss what fruits are missing. Use the talking together and wondering questions at this stage.

The aim is to explore the different sort of fruit Jesus might have been talking about in the verse

I am the vine, and you are the branches. If you stay joined to me, and I to you, you will produce plenty of fruit. But separated from me you won't be able to do anything.

Modern parables

Jesus used stories to help people understand the things of God, even though they weren't necessarily overtly Christian stories. Lots of children's books can be used in a similar way as a conversation starter on the week's theme. Examples are shared here but you may think of others too.

This book explores the idea of needing to work with others to grow and flourish.

- Some twigs these twigs aren't attached to the plant so they aren't growing.
- Safety scissors or a picture of secateurs (or both) sometimes trimming a plant a little bit helps it grow, but we have to be careful.
- Grapes (remember to cut these in half lengthways to avoid choking hazard) grapes grow on a plant called a vine. If the branches are healthy then more grapes grow. They remind us of all the good things we can do because Jesus loves us.

Express

Praying together: how can you involve the children actively in prayer?

Vine prayers

This prayer activity is one of four, the aim is that each week there will be a different prayer focus and a different vine element to build up your vine. However these prayer activities are also designed to work on a stand alone basis.

Week one starts with creating a vine (creative activity) and then adding leaves with your prayers on.



- Cut large leaf shapes from either paper/ material/ crepe paper.
- Think individually, or as a group, of ways in which your church connects with your community. It might be a coffee morning, a toddler group or people from the congregation who work and volunteer in the community.
- Pray for these connections by writing your prayers on the leaf shapes. (You may need
 to test different pens to make sure that the ink is clear enough and doesn't spread too
 much.)
- Twist your prayer leaves onto the vine use a little tape if needed.

This week's paper vine can be used as the basis for creative prayers throughout the 'Growing' series. Different elements can be added each week to build your prayer vine.

Spoken prayer

Dear Jesus
You help us to grow and to flourish
We want to grow and be like you
we want to connect to those around us
and share your story.
When we become disconnected from you bring us close to you.

Amen

Responding together


With an online group, plan whether to deliver any resources in advance or how you will encourage them to use what they've got to hand in their response.

However you do it, it is good for the adults to engage in the response too, and all chat together.

Creating a vine

Make a vine. This is one suggested way, but you could use what ever resources you have to make a really big elaborate vine, perhaps in the church space if you are able or by creating a smaller version in the space where you meet.





Grafting plants

When Jesus talked about the vine he said that God is the gardener, and we are grafted onto Jesus as the vine. This is an opportunity to do some simple gardening together and perhaps learn about the 'grafting' processes from a gardener.

If you have a gardener in your church/community, consider inviting them along to the session to help show how things grow and show how gardeners graft onto plants. Ensure that the gardener provides the opportunity for children to get involved and not simply watch.

This is also an opportunity to do some potting and gardening together. Do you have a piece of ground outside the church that you could plant up to make a lovely mini garden? If you don't have any area to plant, the group could paint and plant some pots to go outside the church.

You may have time for each child to make a smaller potted plant to take home and continue caring for over the coming weeks.

Everyday with Jesus - Walking the Way

What could we do this week to carry on what we've learned? Maybe members of the group could come up with a suggestion. If not, get them to choose from these two challenges:

- One of the best ways to stay connected to God and to grow in faith is to pray, to chat to God. To help get in the habit of doing this it's good to try doing it at the same time each day, at dinner time, or before bed, maybe when brushing your teeth. You do not need to use special words to talk to God, you could start by telling God about any wonderful things that are happening in your life and some things which are worrying you.
- Talk to someone older or younger than you and ask them to tell you something you might not already know about Jesus.
